
Medical Transportation

The Non-Emergency Transportation (NET) program is designed to assist ambulatory clients with the cost of gasoline for trips to medical appointments. The NET program issued Medicaid gas vouchers to 395 people in 2023 with a total annual cost of \$172,495.42. Title XX funds (a separate funding source) were used to help people with medical transportation who did not qualify for Medicaid. Dialysis patients were usually the recipients of Title XX funds. In 2023, 2 people were served via Title XX Transportation with a total cost of \$10,455.88.

The Agency contracted with VANTAGE Aging to provide chore services to APS clients. The Agency also contracts with Gilcrest Adult Day Center to provide a rewarding experience for the elderly population.

2023 brought 216 APS referrals. APS continued to see referrals regarding exploitation. Timely, professional, caring response to these referrals was a great benefit to all APS clients.


